The lock-house belonging to the Wilts and Berks Canal, situate in Pewsham Forest, near Chippenham, Secupied by Mr. Brown, was, broken open on Tuesday night, and robbed of wearing apparel, &c. of considerable value. To obtain a greater booty, the thieres repeatedly threatened to murder Mr. and Mrs. Brown; the latter of whom in aftempting to escape, jumped out of a back-window, and, in doing so, broke one of her legs: she was found under a hedge at a distance from the house, whither she had, with the greatest difficulty, crept for shelter.—On Friday two of our officers succeeded in apprehending, in this city, John Slie (a notorious gipacy), William Herbert, John Collison Pier, and Hester Baker, on strong suspicion of being the offenders in this instance, and conveyed them to Calne for examination; where Pier turned King's evidence, and Slic. Herbert and Hester Baker were fully committed by W. P. Bendry, esq. to Salisbury gaol for trial. Pier was remanded to Marlborough gaol until his evidence sholl have been given .-Bath paper.

SALISBURY. MONDAY, AUGUST 5, 1816.

The business of our Assizes commenced last Monday; Sir James Allan Park presided in the Crown Court, and Sir George Sowley Holroyd at Nisi Prius. The following prisoners were tried, and received sentences as under :--

Samuel Newman, for forging and uttering a certain acceptance of a bill of exchange purporting to be drawn by and R. Holt and Co. upon Messrs. Willis, Perceval, and Co. for 173/. 6s with intent to defraud John Bannister and others at Warminster; Samuel Flower, for amoulting John Dutch on the highway, and robbing him of a silver watch, metal chain, &c.; James Prictor and Edmand Bath, for assaulting Thomas Box on the highway and robbing him of two 10% notes and last in silver; Wm, Herbert and J. Sly for breaking open and robbing a house belonging to the company of proprietors of the Wills and Berks canal navigation, and stealing divers goods; Rob. Shergold, for breaking into the bouse of Samuel Whitehouse at Berwick Bassett, and stealing 100 yards of cotton print, &c.; and John Lampier, for a telony; all recoved sentence of death.—Wm. Strange, for breaking into the house of John Shillard, of Garaden, and stealing six chooses, to be transported seven years; - William Gale, for stealing a paper parcel, containing cloth, out of a waggon belonging to John Pound, and William Durham, for stealing a hat, to be imprisoned twelve months; John Webb, for stealing a silver spoon, and John Parker, for breaking into the press shop of Wm. Mundy, in Bradford, with intent to steal, to be imprisoned 3 months;one prisoner was fined 20s. another was admitted evidence, and eleven were acquitted.

Samuel Newman and Samuel Flower are left for execution, and, if not respiced or reprieved, will suffer the sentence of the law to-morrow se'unight; the other culprits on whom sentence of death was passed have

been reprieved.

"As the trial of Samuel Newman, who is left for execution, has excited considerable interest, we present our readers with the following summary of the evidence adduced on the occasion, and which, we are assured, is correct in substance: -

Mr. John Bannister deposed that he was a banker of Warminster, and one of the firm of Phipps, Biggs, and Bannister; that he was called on, at his own private house in Warminster, in the afternoon of the 8th of May, by the prisoner, who said he was Mr. Hunt, of Frome, and had some bills to discount; witness having told him he was after banking hours, he observed that he was aware of that, and said he had been to the other bank in Warminster, where they had not behaved civilly to him; witness then with the verdict of the
